

# Recommendations



## On foot

- Walk on the left-hand side of the road and on the shoulder if there is one.
- If you are part of a group, walk in single file on roads.
- Wear luminous or reflective garments or accessories at night or when visibility is poor.

## By bike

- Wear a certified helmet.
- Ride on the right-hand side of the road and use the shoulder. If you are part of a group, ride maximum two abreast and always near the shoulder.
- Remember that you'll be alongside pilgrims on foot.

## Sun protection

- Avoid walking in the middle of hot days.
- Use sunscreen and keep your skin hydrated.
- Drink water and fruit juice.
- Wear lightweight, light-coloured clothing.
- Wear a baseball cap or sunhat and sunglasses.

## Do not litter the way

Do not leave paper, wipes or tissues used for personal hygiene in the Way: keep them on you and dispose of them in a bin. Do not leave excrement in sight: bury it.



## Further recommendations

- Protect the natural environment and leave no trace of your visit.
- Carry your personal documents (ID, passport) and valuables (money, credit cards) in a safe place.
- Be wary of strangers not working at the information points who recommend shortcuts or services.
- Activate your GPS system if you.
- Keep to the paths of the Camino and respect private property. Don't create short cuts: these spoil the surroundings and may invade private.
- Do what the signs say. Don't paint graffiti, leave stickers, or damage the signs.
- Enjoy the surroundings and heritage. Take a good image and an even better memory back home with you.
- Consume the natural, organic and local products produced in the market gardens and on the farms along the Way. Enjoy the local cuisine.
- Respect gender, ethnicity, culture and religious equality, and also the rest hours of other pilgrims.
- Help protect natural ecosystems by respecting the flora and fauna and not polluting them.

# Baztan Route

From Urdazubi/Urdax to Arre



A different way to travel the Way of St James is to follow this old branch route, which is the path that the caravans from the port of Bayonne used to use to reach Pamplona. Beautiful places such as Urdazubi/Urdax, Amaiur/Maya or the Valley of Baztan as a whole lead walkers to the Belate

mountain pass and Lantz before reaching Pamplona. Highly recommended if you want to immerse yourself in mystery and legends in a landscape peppered with pastures and forests, mansions and farmhouses.


# Sakana Route

From Irurtzun to Ziordia



This route starts in Irurtzun and runs amid meadows and woodlands that are interspersed with hermitages such as the Santiago de Itxasperi hermitage or the Monastery of Zamartze. The route covers 46 kilometres, passing through 14 municipalities forming part of this valley of the

same name, from Irurtzun to Ziordia, before entering Álava. On the Sakana Route, you will get a view of one of the most spectacular peaks in Navarre, namely Mount Beriain, on the summit of which stands the hermitage of San Donato, at an altitude of almost 1,500 metres.



# Ebro Route

From Cortes to Castejón



Route along the Ebro river that pilgrims coming from the Ebro Delta used to follow before joining the French route in Logroño. The route enters Navarre in Cortes and passes through the monumental city of Tudela, with its outstanding

recently restored cathedral. Perfect if you want to see how Arabs, Jews and Christians lived side by side, and enjoy the contrast between the Las Bardenas desert and the fertile market gardens of the south of Navarre.



# Design your own Way



Traversing the Way of St James is a seminal experience and there is no single way to go about it.

Some people choose to go by bike, others on horseback; some prefer the comfort of their car, while many still opt for the traditional method: to journey on foot.

The French Way of St James is more than 800 km long and 200 of these pass through Navarre.

You can choose where to begin and end each day according to how fit you are or the time available to you.

We suggest you undertake your Way of St James with all the calm needed to savour the essence of the towns and villages you come across on the way.

**Important**  
From 1 November to 31 March, the Luzaide / Valcarlos route (route A) is the only option for the stage from Saint-Jean-Pied-de-Port to Orreaga / Roncesvalles. The Lepoeder or Napoleon route (route B) is strictly forbidden.

## Accommodation

There are various options when it comes to finding accommodation in Navarre whilst following the Santiago Way. Pilgrims' hostels are the most common choice for pilgrims, but you can also choose to stay in hotels, youth hostels, boarding houses, campsites, apartments and rural holiday homes.

If you opt for pilgrims' hostels, you can choose from a very long and varied list along the Santiago Way. The only requisite for accessing and staying at a pilgrims' hostel is to have pilgrimage credentials.

Pilgrims can organise the stages however they like thanks to the wide range of accommodation available in the towns and villages along the Santiago Way, helping relieve the ends of the stages.


